HAS 516 Health and the Aging Process

An overview of information and issues pertinent to the physical and psychosocial health of aging Americans. Includes demographics, attitudes, physiological and psychological changes, health promotion, disease prevention, health care delivery settings, and ethical/legal issues. **HAS 516 is an ELECTIVE course for students enrolled in this master's concentration: HEALTH POLICY/HEALTH CARE MANAGEMENT.**

HAS 531 Healthcare Delivery Systems

This course is designed to provide an overview of the health care delivery enterprise in the United States and to provide students with an understanding of the various forces which shape this enterprise. The course also includes cases studies in health care and how they have shaped the United States health care system. The dynamics of care, evolving public and private regulations and guidelines, and rapid technological advances will be discussed. **CORE: Health Care Management/Health Policy**

HAS 542 The Impact of The Political Setting on Health Policy and Management

The course will examine the influences and effects of politics on the implementation of health policy at the federal, state, and local levels of government. Students will learn to analyze the roles and consequences of various governmental and social entities that are involved in policy implementation; their structures, processes; and the outcomes of selected public policies vis-à-vis legislative or administrative intent. **HAS 542 is an ELECTIVE course for students enrolled in these master's concentrations: HEALTH CARE MANAGEMENT/HEALTH POLICY**

HAS 543 Health Policy

This course is designed to provide students with an overview of health policy-making principles. Specific policy formats will be analyzed using examples of local and national policies. Students will learn to develop selective health policies using case studies. **HAS 543 is a REQUIRED course for students enrolled in this master's concentration: Health Policy. It is an ELECTIVE for students enrolled in this master's concentration: Health Care Management.**

HAS 545 Ethics and Health Care

This course, designed for health care professionals (providers, educators, and managers), provides an overview of the ethics of health care in a rapidly changing society. Students learn how to approach ethical dilemmas using theoretical frameworks and decision-making processes. Ethical issues surrounding health care reform and public health policy, including distribution of resources and rationing of services, are explored. Through the use of case studies, students are introduced to other health topics, such as euthanasia, reproduction, transplants, and HIV/AIDS, from an ethical perspective. The course also includes a review of classic cases in health care ethics and how they have shaped health policy, an overview of patient education and ethics, and a discussion on the professional codes of ethics and standards. Not for credit in addition to HAP 545 or HAY 545. **HAS 545 is an ELECTIVE course for students enrolled in these master's concentrations: HEALTH CARE MANAGEMENT/HEALTH POLICY**

HAS 553 Research Methods and Design

This course acquaints the students with research designs and related methods commonly used to contribute to evidence-base and its application into the fields of health care policy and management. Students will acquire skills for searching, retrieving, reviewing and critically appraising peer-reviewed literature; identify appropriate scientific methods to answer research questions (or test hypotheses); and articulate the major strengths and limitations of various research designs and studies. Students will work independently and as part of a group to learn the process and skills needed to develop a research study: formulate a research question or hypothesis, conduct literature searches, use library resources, critically appraise scientific literature, select an appropriate research design and methods for data collection, and consider the protection of human subjects and health information, including policies and procedures of the Committee on Research Involving Human Subjects (CORIHS). *Prerequisite: HAS 550.* Cannot receive credit for this course and HAS 551. **HAS 553 is a CORE course; it is required of all students in the Master's program. HAS 553 does not count for the Advanced Certificate.**

HAS 554 Marketing in Health Services

This course provides an introductory explanation of marketing as a requisite component of modern business. While presenting the basic principles and general philosophies of marketing, the course concentrates on the importance of marketing in health care service delivery in a managed care environment. **Not for credit in addition to MBA 505.**

HAS 554 is an ELECTIVE course for students enrolled in this master's concentration: Health Care Management.

HAS 576 Workplace 2020

This course provides an overview of the issues affecting the American workplace in the year 21st century. Discusses issues in context of health care environment as students learn how to forecast and plan for changes in the industry and their particular workplaces. Explores issues of technological advances, diversity, quality improvement, customer service and organizational change. The course will emphasize the student's professional development by focusing on the competencies and attitudinal changes necessary to plan for their own career success and contribute to the success of their organization. **HAS 576 is an ELECTIVE course for students enrolled in this master's concentration: HEALTH CARE MANAGEMENT**

Any course that will count toward the Advanced Certificate in Health Care Management (ACHCM) will count as a management elective for students enrolled in the Master of Science in Health Care Policy and Management – management concentration (course must not be a core or concentration required course).
